Long journeys don't always have definitive ends. They take new turns, explore uncharted territories and provide fresh perspectives. Thirty-seven years of caring for children, learning their behaviours and aspirations, as well as strengths and weaknesses, has taken us on a valuable and humbling adventure.

We started by picking up helpless, abandoned children from the streets of Kolkata to give them a home. Paradoxically, as I write, three and a half decades later, we are still grappling with children and their families who desperately need our support, perhaps sometimes in a different way, but intensive support nevertheless. To set the context with one example, India is now an international destination for medical tourism, the government covers health insurance for all, our doctors and hospitals are some of the best in the world yet we have children and their families who need help to get access to that facility, who need reassurance and full understanding of their rights. We have at least one such case to deal with on a daily basis.

In sport we started with playing one game – rugby taught our children to face fear, being mentally strong while being physically small – but now our children have embraced nearly two dozen sports. Surprisingly good at

many, experimenting with some, but always eager to learn. Our academic system has also undergone a cataclysmic change to give every child a chance, not confined to a straight and narrow assessment but encouraging the latent potential in all. We recognise that not every child can be a rocket scientist, but they can be change makers in their own small spheres. In a world riddled with a crisis in leadership we very ambitiously want to create leaders.

Of course, we have targets and goals. We keep the UN Sustainable Development Goals in sight, analysing how each of our overtures contributes in a small way towards them. We are one of the first to be registered on the Social Stock Exchange, are among a handful of NGO's to be under the Government's Mission Vatsalya scheme and our partnerships with generous national and local bodies extend our reach and expertise.

We never forget that in the midst of all of this is the lost child, desperately seeking our help, your help, to create meaning out of chaos. Thank you for helping that child.

SCHOOL

Government schools are free in India and enrolment rates are high, however, many children do not attend school due to family circumstances requiring them to be married off, to work or to help at home.

By providing vulnerable children with an all round education and mentoring we give them the key to unlock opportunity; a chance to get a decent job, escape poverty and support their families.

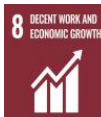

HIGHER EDUCATION & SKILLS TRAINING

Competition for jobs in India remains strong with over 80% working in the unorganised sector. Higher education offers the chance of a career with security and prospects.

In response to the need for five hundred million skilled workers in India in the next decade, our skills centre gives hundreds more youth the chance to take up gainful employment.

MEDICAL CARE & COUNSELLING

For the poorest people in Kolkata health problems play a significant part in their daily life. We witness the suffering families experience without the means to prevent or treat ailments.

When children arrive from the streets or slums they are malnourished and many are ill. Treating these ailments and maintaining good health are essential to a better future.

While India enjoyed admirable growth in the last two decades, millions of people have fallen by the wayside with no perceivable improvement to their lives.

Our outreach team work deep within local communities to target our support to those most at risk of hunger and suffering. As part of our work we advise vulnerable families in the community about their rights and access to benefits.

NO CHILD LEFT BEHIND

Although India has made progress in reducing child marriage in several states, West Bengal remains one of the highest with 41.4% of girls marrying before the age of 18 (The Lancet 2024 & NHFS).

We work closely with the families of girls in our school to prevent early marriage and ensure that they can go on to become independent. From lawyers to nurses and chefs our students are excelling.

37 years on, Future Hope's work remains relevant and important. We continue to see scarred children from extremely traumatic backgrounds where there are no parents or the parents cannot cope, cases of abuse or serious medical conditions. Often these children are not in school. Despite advances in education and poverty alleviation across India, we see many of the problems that deprived families faced 37 years ago are still there today.

At the heart of our work is providing hope and opportunity for children. The first step is to take the children out of their vulnerable situation and provide them with a safe place to stay, regular meals to eat and access to healthcare.

During the holidays she looked forward to accompanying our children to various destinations, and as mothers do, ensured their safety and showered the love and affection that our children craved.

Generous hearted people like Pushpa are the foundations of our care. With little formal education she has remarkably managed to imbibe good values and habits, and the children love her for her warmth, affection and delicious food. Pushpa reciprocates the feelings:

RIJIYA



In January, at the age of 23 and surrounded by her loving family, Rijiya passed away following a long and courageous battle against a terminal illness.

She came to Future Hope in 2011 joining our girl's home and school. She was a regular visitor to our medical room and for more than a decade our team worked hard to get her the best possible specialist care. Rijiya's fighting spirit and resilience were exemplary. Even in her darkest days, she was full of love and trust, always thinking of others.

Her beautiful smile, bravery and kindness will remain with the Future Hope family forever.

Helping children with nothing grow into something

Health comes first and our care is thorough, long-term and often life changing. Dr Sarkar has been working with us for over 25 years and knows every child.

There is the medical part to it, there is the human part to it and there is the long-term approach to it.

“We have taken under our wing small boys and girls from five years of age. Some of them have been physically or sexually abused by family members or by people on the footpath. But now they have a home, they have their self-respect, they have an identity. They look forward to a better life. They want to be something.

Mental health is very important. Some things from the streets leave a mark on the children, but children are adaptable and resilient. If you give them a good healthy upbringing it might be possible to wipe away their past scars.

We have a counsellor in the school, a counsellor in each of the homes and every single child in Future Hope has easy access to them. Every child is seen, heard and listened to. The medical team works closely with the counsellors, houseparents and teachers to ensure that the best care for that child is continued across all areas.

The happiness that you can derive when you see a small girl in class 5 become a lawyer or somebody who is going to a five star hotel as a chef, it is amazing. I see it happening in front of my eyes. I think that is what everyone in Future Hope should be proud of. It is a combined effort that gives a child a proper opportunity to grow.”

“I remember a child Tim and I got off the street many years ago; he was incredibly ill, screaming in pain and lying in his own vomit. To get that child out of treatment and thriving, gives us great joy. He is now doing brilliantly in IT, earning a good salary. He is married, healthy and has a bright future ahead of him.”

Inclusion can only take place with physical and attitudinal access. Children with Special Educational Needs require special attention and care in order to learn basic skills. Future Hope has created such an ambience that allows these children to learn with pride.

Bansari* is a lovely girl who comes from the streets and has difficulty in accessing the mainstream curriculum. She has shown interest in sports and has thrived in the Karate classes where her confidence has soared.



Her greatest strength is her ‘never give up’ attitude. No matter how hard the task, she puts in her 100% to accomplish it. For her we plan an Outcome Based Education (OBE), which consists of vocational training alongside a child centric educational programme with focus on basic literacy and numeracy skills that will help her become a confident and self-reliant individual.” Tamasa Das, Special Educational Needs

In the ‘Education World Awards’, we won 1st Prize for Philanthropic School in West Bengal.

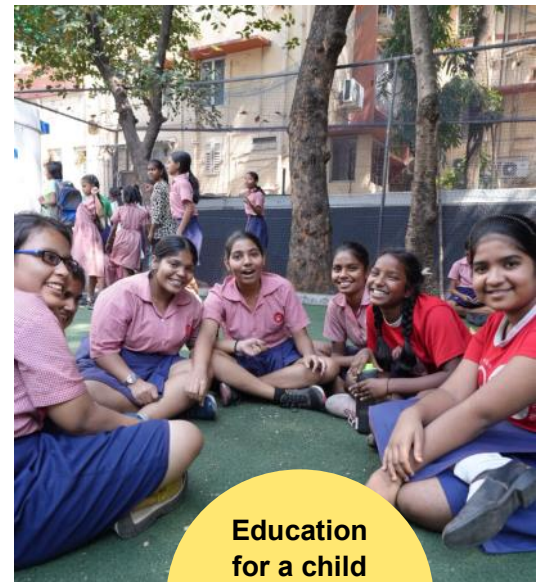
Our girls are thriving

"In our society girls are not given much priority, especially from where I belong. ADDITIONS TO ROWLAND ROAD PROVIDE MORE OPPORTUNITY

With space at an absolute premium we have found more ways to keep adding to the work that we do. Three new classrooms were built on the roof to be able to run the school as one whole again, rather than in two shifts. This has brought back the unity and camaraderie that is special to our school and the ability to run more clubs. We do not have the space in our current premises to obtain Class 11 and 12 CBSE affiliation—we have to build our new school campus in Rajarhat.

A new outdoor classroom on the small piece of green in the garden allows for lesson time within nature and for creativity to flourish.

We moved and upgraded the Special Needs and Fast Track areas to the mezzanine floor which provides a dedicated section for these students and made space for a new Lower Kindergarten in line with the National Education Policy. The most colourful addition; a pink container as our bicycle workshop!



GREEN THINKING

India has a long history of art. We know how important it is to encourage newer generations to interact with the arts and expose them to cultural and artistic diversity. At Future Hope art is integrated into the children's lives through many different art forms, from traditional dance and drama to pottery and poetry. The children embrace art as a way to explore new topics, to communicate their thoughts and views to others and most of all, to express their emotions.

CHALLENGING NEW THINKING THROUGH DRAMA

The theme of "Artificial Intelligence vs Human Touch" was testing, but the children rose to the challenge. It took months of research on deepfakes, voice cloning, university scams and the latest in artificial intelligence. Building props, writing scripts, rehearsals and staging were carried out with huge commitment. And the result; four brilliant productions in our annual "Katie Baddeley" drama competition. "Seldom have I seen such intense and varied depictions on stage," said Music Producer and Director Kaushik Dutta, one of the judges.

My best experience is being part of Inter-House Drama Competition and our Future Hope Mela. During this time students from different classes work together. Teachers and students give their best to make the event a success.



THE ANNUAL MELA is a display of the creativity of our children, and their love. This year's theme was **Care: Care for others, Care for the planet and Care for oneself.**

More than 1500 pairs of feet crossed into Future Hope to enjoy 21 performances, eat from 10 food stalls, play 8 different games like Make the Pyramid, Jumbled Words, and Crazy Mini Golf, all made from recycled materials.

The children stitched colourful quilts from scraps of cotton, whilst others decorated clay pots with intricate patterns, showing their skill, patience and passion for creativity. We had special handicraft stalls to sell their handicrafts.

Messages of care and compassion were embedded all around, especially the décor with its traditionally painted murals depicting scenes of care, and the beautiful handmade paper lanterns hanging in the trees. This created the perfect set for an evening full of song, dance, drama, a 'Care-givers Walk' and huge amounts of laughter.

Now, having achieved a Bachelors in Physical Education, Moidul has secured a highly prized job as a Trainer with a pioneering company in the field of school sports in India.

HEALTHY COMPETITION HELPS ACHIEVE SOCIAL INCLUSION

Competing is an important part of creating confidence and resilience, and it helps our children to feel they are as good as others.

Taking part in the Himalayan Cup for the first time, our girls team did themselves proud, taking second place out of 14 schools! They also experienced mountains, waterfalls and delicious different food.



LEADERSHIP AND VALUES

Three days of Khelo Rugby Winter Camp across 6 locations with more than 3,000 children, 200 young leaders and over 8700 breakfasts!

Organised by our young coaches the camp is a huge learning experience that offers our rugby crazy children so much fun as well as vital lessons in sport and life skills.



REALISING POTENTIAL

Introducing children to a wide variety of sports, from hockey to rowing and chess, helps them to find an activity that suits them.

During the summer, 40 children joined formal swimming lessons. Two of them have already won medals in a competitive gala, "It felt really good especially since I only started swimming in June," Bijay, 11 years old.

HELPING OUR STUDENTS TO SEE THE LONG-TERM BENEFITS OF STAYING IN EDUCATION

Rahul is our first student to venture into a medical technology course. He opted for the four-year degree course in Optometry and has completed three years. In the meantime, he has been offered a one year internship in Jamshedpur Eye Hospital starting in June 2024.

Ever since he cleared his class 12 board exams, his family has been keen that he started working and earning, but he is focussed on getting a degree. He helped his family with house work, did the odd job to earn some money and carried on with his studies.

Many of our children fall prey to short-term thinking. Rahul was wise enough to realise that for a better future it is important to get qualified, even specialised.

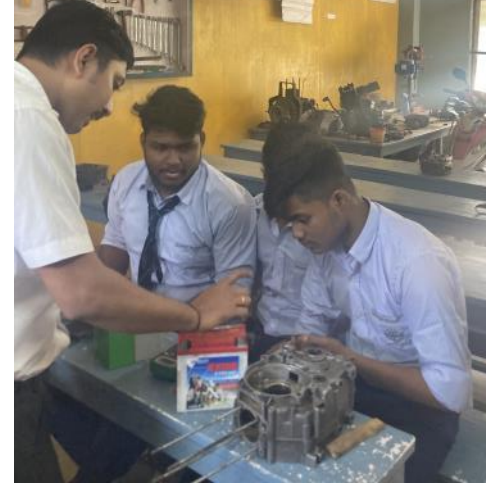
It seems the need of the hour is skilled-based education

Even the Indian government is making rapid strides towards it. With our own Future Hope George Telegraph Skills Training Institute (FHGTTI) offering a wide array of courses to skill youth for employment, we can offer our students a strong alternative to higher education as well as helping further vulnerable youth move towards employment.

Tapan, 16, had a late start in school and was finding it difficult to cope with the demands of regular education. A tailor-made course in two wheelers has brought relief for him as he thrives in the hands-on training and feels he can take responsibility for his future.

Some day I would like to open my own business in automobiles and earn enough to support my family, dreams Tapan.

We currently have 330 students gaining qualifications across 8 skills courses at our FHGTTI and are aiming to double this number over the coming years to 700 students doing 11 courses.



HOSPITALITY IS A FAST GROWING INDUSTRY ACROSS INDIA

This area has already provided many of our young people with incredible opportunities across India and abroad. There are a range of new Higher Education and Skills courses opening up, offering good careers and the chance to grow if you work hard.



This year, four more students opted for a degree course in Culinary Arts and three others trained with Saathiya Skills Academy and have recently been placed as interns in five star hotels. Rohit and (other) Rohit completed six months training with Jamie's Italian in Delhi and have since been employed by them. Javed has been cruising the world as a newly qualified chef and is learning more every day. This has encouraged us to plan for hospitality courses at our Skills Centre in Barrackpore, starting soon!

INDEPENDENT AND EMPLOYABLE, INTRODUCING A LEADERSHIP COURSE

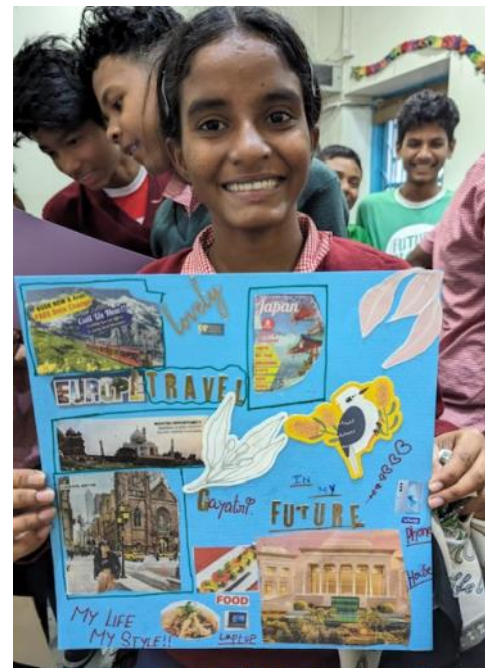
With a lack of role models or people in their communities to guide them, it is essential that we provide a mentoring role and find ways to support our youth through education and well into their careers. This year, a team from 'Full Circle Social Enterprises' is running a leadership course. Leader Tina explains:

"There were several workshops held with 30 Future Hope students from Classes 8 to 12. We employed creative approaches to engage with the children including the use of digital cameras, mindfulness exercises and storytelling.

There were heartfelt moments such as when role models were discussed, with one student choosing her mother because she sacrificed so much for her to attend school, and another choosing counselling as a career because he wants to help people to live happier lives.

Although they were quick to point out the talents and strengths in their friends, they struggled to see this in themselves, creating an opportunity for cultivation of confidence and self awareness.

It's clear that the students of Future Hope feel deep gratitude and love for the school, teachers and supporters of Future Hope. **They are able to thrive in an environment that cultivates them in all ways towards a better future."**

MY MOTHER ALWAYS TOLD ME, “I DON’T WANT TO GIVE YOU A LIFE LIKE I HAVE HAD”

Growing up, Nikhat watched her mother struggle to provide for her and her siblings. “My mother worked as a domestic help, carried bricks at constructions sites and did whatever she could to earn a little more. We lived deep in the slums and would share one chapati for our tea. That’s when she took me somewhere that would change my life, Future Hope.”

Her mother’s struggle spurred Nikhat on to work hard at school and pursue a degree. “My priority was education because I knew that would be my tool to change my circumstances. Unlike many others, my mother never insisted that I get married instead of doing a job.” Now 25 years old, Nikhat manages a medical clinic, is pursuing an MBA and earns enough to look after herself and her family. Together with her brother, she has been able to rent a two bedroom flat in a residential area where she lives with her mother and sister.



Nikhat spends time talking to young people in her community who face similar challenges.

“I see myself in many of them. I tell them my story, where I came from and hope that will motivate them. I tell them it is important to have a goal in life and be focussed”.

With a degree in journalism, Nikhat recently enjoyed her studio time as the narrator of our exciting new podcast; **Hope Within The Mango Trees**.
